A Brief History of The Christian Restoration Association

To begin the story of the CRA we begin with the estate of one Sidney S. Clarke. Sidney S. Clarke was a Christian gentleman who left part of his estate to the keeping of the Richmond Street Christian Church, Cincinnati, Ohio, for the purpose of helping to establish new churches in "destitute places," meaning "communities where there is no church of Christ." The elders of the Richmond Street church immediately put the money to good use and within a two-year period the estate helped establish thirty congregations in seven states.

THE CINCINNATI BIBLE SEMINARY

Because of the infidelity being espoused in the preacher training schools, the trustees of the CRA realized that a school was needed that would produce Biblebelieving preachers who would stand for the faith once delivered to the saints.

In 1923, two schools had begun, one in Cincinnati and one in Louisville. It was felt that better stewardship would be shown if these two schools could merge. In 1924, the schools merged and formed The Cincinnati Bible Seminary. The trustees of

the Clarke Fund were the trustees of the new school. H.F. Lutz was considered the first president of the new school on an interim basis. He died that first year and James DeForest Murch became interim president because of his position as President of the Clarke Fund.

In 1928, the CRA trustees helped set up another board of trustees for the Bible college and helped established it as a separate institution from the CRA. The first official president was Ralph Records.

Misunderstood Thomas

One of the most famous scenes in the Bible after the resurrection of Jesus is the proof required by Thomas.

On Easter Sunday, Thomas required more evidence that Jesus was alive than the testimony of his peers, and this gave him the title, "Doubting Thomas."


I believe this is an unfair assessment for this Apostle of our Lord. A better label for Thomas would be "Misunderstood" because everyone seems to miss a very important quality in this Apostle. There are very few references to Thomas, but there is enough to find out that he was a fisherman (John 21:2), and he was not afraid to speak up (John 11:16). His personality seems to be a lot like the Bereans in Acts 17:11. The Bereans were known for checking up on the teachers to make sure that what was being taught was in accordance with scripture. Thomas was doing the same thing when questioning the reports of the other Apostles.

As we enter into the Easter season, let us remember that Thomas helped prove the evidence of the resurrection by questioning the testimonies of the other Apostles. Let us therefore be confident that the resurrection has withstood the test of proof and should be celebrated with confidence as there is no doubt that Jesus rose from the grave just as He said He would!

You may have read the letter to the Philippians several times. In fact, you may have studied the letter on many occasions with all of the lessons that come from this work of the Apostle Paul inspired by God. But have you ever taken the time to get to know the people Paul wrote to? Have you ever wondered how their church got started? The book of Acts shares the story of the Apostle Paul's first encounter with the church in Philippi, and it is this text that will be the focus of this month's article. So grab your Bible, and read Acts 16 to see the story of the beginning of the church in Philippi.

At this particular point of the second missionary journey of Paul, he was joined by Timothy, who was a well known disciple, and they traveled with Silas and Luke to Troas. While at Troas, Paul had a vision of a Macedonian man begging for help, so Paul changed his plans and headed toward Philippi, which is a leading city in the district of Macedonia. Since Philippi was a Roman colony, there were not enough Jews to establish a synagogue, so Paul had to go outside the city gate to find a place of prayer that was established near the river by some faithful women. Among the women who were worshipping God was a woman named Lydia, whom Paul baptized while at the prayer group. Lydia was a dealer in purple cloth which was the most expensive color available, so she had many resources that proved useful as the church began to grow.

One day, while Paul and his companions were going to the place of prayer, Paul performed an exorcism for a slave girl who was making a lot of money for her owners. The owners got angry with Paul and had Paul and Silas arrested and thrown into prison. While in prison, the Lord caused an earthquake that shook the prison, and the shackles fell off the prisoners. The jailer was afraid that everyone escaped, but Paul assured him that everyone was still there, and then proceeded to convert the jailer and his family.

Once released, Paul and Silas returned to the church that was moved to Lydia's house and encouraged the faithful. When it was time for Paul to move on, he decided to leave Luke behind to minister to the church in Philippi and establish Elders and Deacons. After 5 years, Luke rejoined Paul and his companions indicating that the church in Philippi was now able to function independently.

At the time the letter to the Philippians was written, 12 years had passed since Paul's visit to the church in Philippi, and after reading the letter, there is evidence that the church continued to thrive and even supported Paul while he was on his missionary journeys. The church had humble beginnings as a prayer group led by women beside a river outside the city gates, but it grew into a thriving church that served as an example for other churches to follow. Paul was closely attached to this church as he expressed his gratitude and excitement for everything they have done. May our church be just as faithful with our task of reaching our communities for Christ!
