<u>Show-Stopping Beauty</u> - Think about the Academy Awards Ceremony. Where are most of the cameras located? Not inside the theater. In recent years, the red carpet show has all but eclipsed the awards ceremony itself. Photographers jostle for position, hoping to capture images of the beautiful people as they arrive. Best-dressed and most glamorous celebrities get almost as much press as the awards recipients.



Our culture idolizes outward beauty and the people who embody it in our society today. Still, we know that ideas of beauty change over time and across cultures. What is beauty, really? Is there a definition, a portrait of beauty that endures through all times and applies in every place? The surprising answer is yes!

At first, that picture may surprise you. Unsurpassed, eternal beauty hung on a rough-hewn cross on that day Christians call Good Friday. Beauty hung beneath a dark, threatening sky.

True beauty is there, at Christ's cross. It's unmistakable. The beauty of our Lord is clearly visible as, in love, He takes onto Himself the repulsiveness of our sin.

We don't often picture sin in that way-as repulsive. Instead, we think of it as wrong or hurtful, and it is. Yet when someone close to us is surly or sullen, we sometimes say to them, "Don't be ugly."

Sin is that-ugly. Truth be told, we almost always act in ugly ways when resentment, anger, or a desire for vengeance begins growing in our hearts.

But Jesus died to wash away those sins. In their place, He wraps us in His grace, giving us His very own beauty-His perfect obedience. That beauty, that holiness, comes to us as His gift, and it works in us so that we become more outwardly beautiful too, in forgiveness, patience, and love.

His light shines into every dark corner of our hearts, and as a result, His light begins to shine through us into the lives of those around us. They see our peace and know there's just something different, something beautiful, about us.

<u>Rose Petals</u> - A new minister was walking with an older, more seasoned minister in the garden one day. Feeling a bit insecure about what God had for him to do, he was asking the older preacher for some advice. The older preacher walked up to a rosebush and handed the young preacher a rosebud and told him to open it without tearing off any petals.

The young preacher looked in disbelief at the older preacher and was trying to figure out what a rosebud could possibly have to do with his wanting to know the will of God for his life and ministry. But because of his great respect for the older preacher, he proceeded to try to unfold the rose, while keeping every petal intact. It wasn't long before he realized how impossible this was to do.

Noticing the younger preacher's inability to unfold the rosebud without tearing it, the older preacher began to recite the following poem:

It is only a tiny rosebud, a flower of God's design; but I cannot unfold the petals with these clumsy hands of mine. The secret of unfolding flowers is not known to such as I. GOD opens this flower so easily, but in my hands they die. If I cannot unfold a rosebud, this flower of God's design, then how can I have the wisdom to unfold this life of mine? So I'll trust in God for leading each moment of my day. I will look to God for guidance in each step of the way. The path that lies before me, only my Lord knows. I'll trust God to unfold the moments, just as He unfolds the rose.

### Barnabas (Acts 4:36-37; 9:26-27)

This month, we will be looking at a person in the Bible who was a good model for anyone who wants to become a good parent. When it comes to parenting, we often have to be good mentors for our children as they grow up. We also have to be a mediator for those times that our children want to transition from one stage of life to another. We can act on their behalf to help prepare the way. And ultimately, if we want to become good parents, we need to be a model for our kids to follow.

Barnabas was a great associate for the early church leaders. He was always willing to introduce new workers and help train them to be useful for Kingdom. Beginning with his name, Son of Encouragement, he has always been the kind of person who would encourage others. Once in a leadership role, he continued to be an encourager as he had done many good things for the church. Although the accounts of Barnabas involve his role as a leader for the church, we can learn from his example and we can lead our families in the same way.

Barnabas is not a well known character in the Bible mainly because of the Apostle Paul becoming the leader of the group, but we do have enough information to see how Barnabas was a good mentor, mediator and model for those who were in his circle of influence.

### I. The Mentor

- A. Levite from Cyprus (Acts 4:36)
- B. Cousin John Mark (Mother hosted prayer meeting while Peter was in prison Acts 12:12)
- C. God prepared Barnabas for mentoring (We have been prepared too!)

#### II. The Mediator

- A. Brought Paul to the Apostles (Acts 9:26-27)
- B. Restored John Mark and Paul
  - 1. Acts 15:2 Disagreement
  - 2. 1 Corinthians 9:6 Paul and Barnabas work together
  - 3. Colossians 4:10 Paul and John Mark work together
  - 4. 2 Timothy 4:11 Paul requested John Mark to join him because he was "Useful for me in my ministry" (Complete restoration took place)

### III. The Model

- A. Good man full of the Holy Spirit (Acts 11:24)
- B. Opened the door for Paul at Antioch
- C. Faded into the background (Acts 13:4-12)

(Barnabas and Paul became Paul and Barnabas)

We need to find ways to fade into the background as we elevate our kids to become the men and women God has called them to be. We need to be able to release them into God's hands fully equipped, ready to conquer the world for Christ! And the only way to make sure this happens is to be that model that our kids need so they can follow in our footsteps.

1. Keep it easy. Choose simple tackle, bait and techniques. Fish for a species that is plentiful and easy to catch. Your goal should be to keep their rod bent as much as possible. Don't worry about catching a fish that YOU will be proud of...catch anything! The more interesting, colorful and unique the fish, the more excited they will be.

2. Keep it short. Marathon days are not what they need. Try to find fishing spots VERY close to home that that don't require long car or boat rides.

3. Keep them covered. Use plenty of sunscreen and protective clothing. Try not to make anything about the experience painful or unpleasant.

4. Keep them happy. Take lots of snacks including a treat that usually is not allowed at home. Snacks can help break up moments of frustration and will keep the kids interested.

5. Keep your cool. Expect to re-bait hooks and take out line tangles and knots all day. This is their day, not yours. The quickest way to turn children off to fishing is to get frustrated with them. Teach them what you know – tell them about birds, plants, or fish. Kids remember these things and find it interesting. Read to them about fish.

6. Keep a few fish for dinner. Keep fish within the legal catch limits and never keep more than you plan to eat. These lessons mold responsible and conscientious anglers helping to ensure the future of our fishery resources.


(Ask those questions about our community too!)
