Fewer tools will be lost. No frantic search parties at bedtime for lost blankets. Socks will miraculously find their mates, and the car keys will be right where I left them.

But of course other things will have changed, too.

When the kids are gone, we won't hear the pitter-patter of little feet running down the hallway, then feel a warm, wiggly body crawling into bed and snuggling with us early on Saturday morning.

No more little-girl, frilly Easter dresses or first days of school. No winter picnics or log cabin playhouses. No more fishing and hunting trips or wiener roasts or just goofing around with a childish hand in mine.

Someday there will be no more handmade Father's Day cards or wooden plagues titled "World's Best Mom." No more crayon drawings, verses and stick people drawn on construction paper and displayed on the refrigerator.

So until someday arrives, we're going to cherish our moments together. We're going to try to take seriously-but happily-the apostle Paul's counsel: "Making most of your time."

Sticky or not

"How lonely sits the city that was full of people! How like a widow has she become, she who was great among the nations! She who was a princess among the provinces has become a slave." (Lamentations 1:1)

When Jeremiah wrote the book of Lamentations, he was recalling a very painful event in his life. That event was the siege of Jerusalem and the capture of the Jews. The details of this siege are recorded in Jeremiah 52 and 2 Kings 24:18-25:30. For years, Jeremiah was warning the Jews about the wrath of God and how their infidelity was out of control, but nobody wanted to hear what he had to say. Instead, the king surrounded himself with prophets who told him what he wanted to hear and the end result was a nation that frowned upon the truth that Jeremiah was preaching. And now that the Babylonians destroyed them, Jeremiah had the right to feel satisfied that his prophecies came true. However, his heart was crushed when he watched Jerusalem burn to the ground because there was nothing he could do about it.

In order to work through his grief, Jeremiah wrote a collection of poems that helped him sort out his thoughts and deal with the pain in his heart. That collection of poems became the Old Testament book Lamentations so we can have this useful resource today. By learning about the struggles of Jeremiah, we can see that we are not alone in our struggles with this life. Way too often, we look beyond the realities of life that are recorded in the Bible because we think that being a good Christian means we have to focus on the positive. Instead of opening up and letting our Christian friends comfort us in our time of need we have a tendency to shut down and hide our pain because we don't want people to see our weaknesses. We are afraid that the people at church will look down on us for being human, and the sad part is the world feels the same way. Somehow the American church has created this reputation for being insensitive to the needs of people who are hurting, and until we can correct this issue, we will never be able to reach those who really need help.

The American church needs a reality check, and it starts with evaluating what is being taught in the church service. A quick study of the songs that are sung and the sermons being preached will reveal a disturbing trend that has contributed to this image of the church being unrealistic. When a person is struggling, the immediate response appears to be to pray harder and sing passionately at church. If we can somehow find the right song to sing and the right words to pray, we will forget about our struggles and the world will be ok. While all of that sounds good on the surface, this kind of response is like putting an angry bird band-aid on a broken leg. Instead of trying to praise our way out of despair, we need to take an honest look at our situation so we can figure out how we got into this mess, and then we can see how to fix the problem. This is why the book of Lamentations is such a great book for those who struggle.

As Jeremiah processes the destruction that took place, he writes about the city of Jerusalem that was destroyed (Chapter 1), and then reflects on the sins of the people who turned away from God (Chapter 2). After expressing his grief over the tragedy, Jeremiah turns to his own frustration and pain as he cries out to God (Chapter 3), and then he focuses on the real cause for the tragedy which is the infidelity of the nation (Chapter 4). In chapter 5, Jeremiah is now ready to accept the reality of the situation as he prays for God to restore them. Working through the details of the tragedy helped Jeremiah cope with his pain, and that is a great lesson for those of us who are struggling with life.

God gives what's right, not what is left.

"My entire family and all my friends live in Florida, plus I have a great job there. I'm leaving my whole life behind." Another trickle of tears slipped out of the corner of her eye.

"I moved to Louisville from far away too," I explained, trying to comfort her. "It's a great place to live."

"I guess so, " she murmured, sounding unconvinced.

Despite my efforts, I was not helping one bit. Until the perfect question suddenly presented itself. "Do you love him?"

Her expression changed instantly. "Oh, yes!" She blushed at her own enthusiasm, then stumbled over a rush of words. "He's very kind and considerate, really intelligent, and handsome too." As she brushed away the last of her tears, she told me about her beloved husband-to-be, how much fun they had together, how impressed her family was with him, and, yes, how much she loved him.

I nodded and listened, knowing no further questions would be needed.

When we landed and headed into the gate area, I picked him out of the crowd instantly. Even from a distance, he was obviously a fine young man. Tall and broad-shouldered, he was armed with a warm, welcoming grin and a dozen red roses that matched her red suit perfectly. When she ran into his embrace with a teary smile, I made myself look away (very difficult) rather than invade their privacy. A few happy tears sneaked into my own eyes.
